### **Recreational Skipper's Ticket**

The person in charge of a recreational vessel with a motor of 6 horsepower or less is not required to hold a Recreational Skipper's Ticket (RST). A skipper in charge of a recreational vessel with a motor greater than 6 horsepower is required to hold a RST and

### Age restrictions

carry it when boating.

A person under 10 years may not drive a motor boat. RST holders over 14 but under 16 years of age are restricted to operating during daylight hours at a speed less than 8 knots.

### **Interstate skipper's tickets**

If you hold a valid/current interstate ticket, recognised by the Department of Transport (DoT) and you enter, as a visitor or with the intention of permanently residing in Western Australia, you have three months to have to have the qualification recognised.

Regardless from which state your boat is from you must hold a RST or equivalent to operate a vessel with a motor greater than 6 horsepower.


### **Medical fitness**


# Obstruction of navigation aids, channels and

Cray pots, drop nets, fishing nets, marker buoys or other buoyed objects cannot be placed or allowed to remain in any channel or fairway in any port or harbour, or in any channel, fairway or passage in



any navigable waters without the permission of DoT. Also, you can't anchor or moor a vessel in any channel or fairway, unless the vessel is in distress.

Safe Water Marks

Can be used as a landfall mark

with safe water all round.

Light: White, occulting, isophase, 1 longflash every 10 seconds or

Morse Code "A" (1 short + 1 long flash)

**Islolated Danger Marks** 

Indicates an area of isolated danger

Light: White, group of 2 flashes

Special Marks

Used to indicate special areas such

as traffic separation schemes.

aquaculture sites etc.

Light: Yellow, any rhythm

### Aids to navigation

It is illegal to interfere with, remove or damage any beacon, buoy or other artificial aid to navigation. Without permission in writing from DoT, it is illegal to secure any vessel to any beacon,

Please **remember to log on** to Marine Rescue before heading out to sea and supply them with the:

- vessel's name, registration number or call sign;

- trip intentions;

estimated time of return.

## **Boat ramp courtesy**

A good skipper plans for a day on the water and organises equipment, motors and mooring lines before leaving for the boat ramp. Remember to:

- use designated rigging and de-rigging areas to avoid impeding other people launching and retrieving vessels;
- follow the directions on signage and or painted on the roadway;
- use the correct lanes for launch and retrieval;
- move quickly to the end of the jetty allowing for other people to launch and recover;
- have patience with other less experienced boaters; and
- read all information signs at boat ramps to familiarise yourself with the local area.

### **Navigation buoys and markers**

**Lateral Marks** 

Used to indicate the port and starboard

sides of a navigable channel.

Port Marks

Light: Red, any rhythm

Starboard Marks

Light: Green, any rhythm

buoy, seamark or other aid to navigation.

### Marine Rescue Western Australia

- departure point and time;
- destination;
- number of people on board;
- amount of fuel carried; and

This basic information can make the difference in a response to an emergency situation.

It is also important to **remember to log off** to avoid a search being initiated.

### **Cardinal marks**

Used to indicate that deeper water lies in a compass direction away from a danger area such as a reef, shallow areas, etc.
