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Required Safety Equipment R = Recommended = Required Recreational Skipper's Ticket The skipper of a recreational vessel, powered by a motor greater than 6hp must hold an RST. Bilge Pump/Bailer All vessels must carry a bilge pump. Vessels under 7 metres may carry a baller in lieu of a bilge pump. Vessels with an inboard engine or carrying hydrocarbon heating or cooling appliances must carry an approved fire extinguisher. Anchor and Line An efficient anchor and line must be carried. Lifejacket 100 (or higher) with the Australian Standard AS 1512, AS 4758 or



ISO 12402 must be carried for every person onboard.

Red and Orange Flares (in date)

At least two hand held red flares and two hand held orange flares must be carried. Two parachute flares may be carried in lieu of the two

Parachute Flares (in date)

A minimum of two parachute flares must be carried if operating more than 5 miles from the mainland shore or more than 1 mile from an

Marine Radio

A marine radio must be carried if operating more than 5 miles from the mainland shore or more than 1 mile from an island located more than 5 miles from the mainland shore. The radio can be 27 MHz, VHF or HE

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Tender vessels

Due to the high traffic density and vessels anchored in close proximity in Perth Water on Australia Day, any tender vessel that is seen to be used for any other purpose than ship to shore or ship to ship passenger transfers will be prohibited from operating.

It is important to note that a tender to a larger vessel is only exempt from the registration requirement provided it meets the following criteria:

- it is no more than 3.1 metres long and has a motor no bigger than 5hp;
- is used only as a lifeboat or for ship to shore transport, and for no other purpose;
- must carry the correct safety equipment for the area of operation; and
- must have the letters 'TT' or the words 'Tender to', followed by the parent vessels registration numbers displayed clearly on each side of the vessel.

Anchoring

Anchoring is only permitted within the two designated Spectator vessel areas. Please keep the channels clear and remain within these areas (see map overleaf).

On water patrols

Department of Transport Marine Officers, Water Police and Department of Biodiversity Conservation and Attractions will be patrolling the area; so if you are unsure of anything feel free to wave a patrol vessel down for assistance. Officers can also be contacted on Channel 9 VHF or Channel 88 on 27MHz.

Alcoho

It is an offence to operate a vessel under the influence of alcohol and drugs.

Marine safety considerations

Have you checked your safety gear? For this event we recommend:

- bucket or bailer;
- a suitable anchor (ensure that you check the condition of the anchor and attached rope and chain);
- an approved fire extinguisher if you have an in board engine or cooking appliances on board;
- lifejackets for all on board, (ensure that they are of a suitable size if carrying children);
- flares; and
- check navigation lights and carry spare bulbs and fuses.

Flares

There are severe penalties for the improper use of flares. It is an offence to use or set off a distress signal flare except in the case of an emergency.

Courtesy

The Skyworks see a lot of vessels coming together into a few confined areas which can often result in congestion. Many people arrive early to get the best positions and to avoid the last minute rush. Please be courteous to other boaters, don't push in and ensure you have adequate swing room between other vessels when anchoring.

River access

Recreational Skipper's Ticket (RST)

Carry your Recreational Skipper's Ticket with you! It is an offence to operate a recreational vessel, powered by a motor greater than 6hp, without holding a current RST.

Navigation lights

Navigation lights are required to be displayed from sunset to sunrise. Check that your navigational lights are working and are correct for your type of vessel.

- Separate or combined sidelights, a masthead light and a stern light; or
- Separate or combined sidelights, an all round white light.
- Masthead or white all round light shall be carried at least one metre above the sidelights.
- If at anchor an all round white light shall be displayed.
- Vessels of less than 7 metres in length whose maximum speed cannot exceed 7 knots shall exhibit a clearly visible, all round white light.
