Logging on and off

Skippers are advised to log on and off every time they go out on their boats with their nearest radio station. Typically a Marine Rescue WA group, Australian Coast Radio Monitors (ACRM) base or Water Police.

When logging on with a radio station let them know who you are, where you are going, when you will arrive back and log off on your return.

Logging on procedure

Logging on is a simple process and you'll know you've told someone responsible when you're due to arrive back and they will take the appropriate action if you haven't called in by then. If you change your planned time, call the radio station again and advise them of your change in plans.

- estimated time of return.

Logging off procedure

It is very important to remember to log off with the radio station that you logged on with, to avoid a search being initiated.

This is an example of the radio call and the details the radio station will need to take you off their log:

You say: Marine Rescue [Station Name], Marine Rescue [Station Name], Marine Rescue [Station Name] - This is [vessel registration (3 times)] OVER.

Marine Rescue will reply: This is Marine Rescue [Station Name] please go to channel xx OVER.

You say: Going to channel xx (Change to channel xx and wait for Marine Rescue to call you).

Marine Rescue will call you 3 times (vessel rego) and say OVER.


You say: Marine Rescue [Station Name] this is [vessel rego] I wish to log off.

VMR Station will say: Thank you for logging off.

You say: This is [vessel rego] thanks OUT.

GPS validation mark

Water skiing involves being towed over water at a speed of 8 knots or more by a vessel.

It takes at least three people to go water skiing:

- 1. A driver of at least 17 years of age with a Recreational Skipper's Ticket.
- 2. An observer of at least 14 years of age.
- 3. A person being towed. Vessels taking off with skiers always give way to vessels landing a skier.

Beach take-off and landings are only permitted in the designated take-off and landing areas. Skiing is only permitted between the hours of sunrise to sunset,

unless otherwise indicated. For further information, please visit our website or call 13 11 56. **Lifejackets and safety equipment.** Skippers must CARRY a

lifejacket minimum Level 100 for everyone on board when they are on any WA waterway. Compulsory wearing of a lifejacket minimum Level 100 occurs

when more than 400 metres from the shore in unprotected waters for children aged between one and 12 years and for everyone on board when the vessel is less than 4.8 metres. Every person on board a PWC must WEAR a lifejacket Level

50s or higher at all times, from launching until retrieval. If skiing more than 400 metres from the shore in unprotected

Non public water ski area

Kalgan River: All that portion of the Kalgan River bounded on the south by a line drawn westward from the northern boundary of Plantagenet Location 517 and extending northwards to a line drawn eastwards from the southern boundary of Plantagenet Location 241. This area has been set aside for use by the Western Australian Water Ski Association (Inc) and is under the control of the Albany Water Ski Club.


Courtesy moorings

Red public courtesy moorings are provided by the DTMI for public usage and are suitable for recreational vessels up to 15m in length. Courtesy moorings are available for a maximum of 72 hours. Vessels are not to be left unattended for more than 4 hours. Suitable only in winds up to 40 knots.

Personal water craft (PWC)

Every skipper of a PWC must hold an RST. A skipper who is older than 14 but under 16 years of age with an RST can only operate a PWC during daylight hours at a maximum speed of 8 knots. Every person on board a PWC must wear a lifejacket (minimum 50S) at all times. Additionally:

 When travelling beyond 400 metres from shore in unprotected waters you



must be worn). flares or electronic visual distress signal (EVDS)

Beyond 4 nautical miles from shore in unprotected waters, a VHF marine radio must also be carried.
